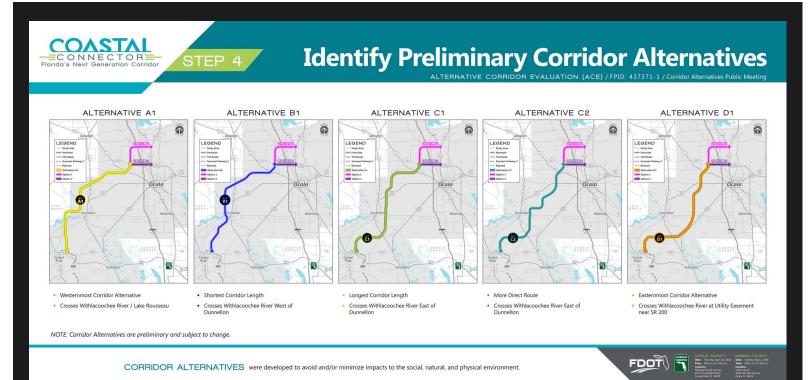

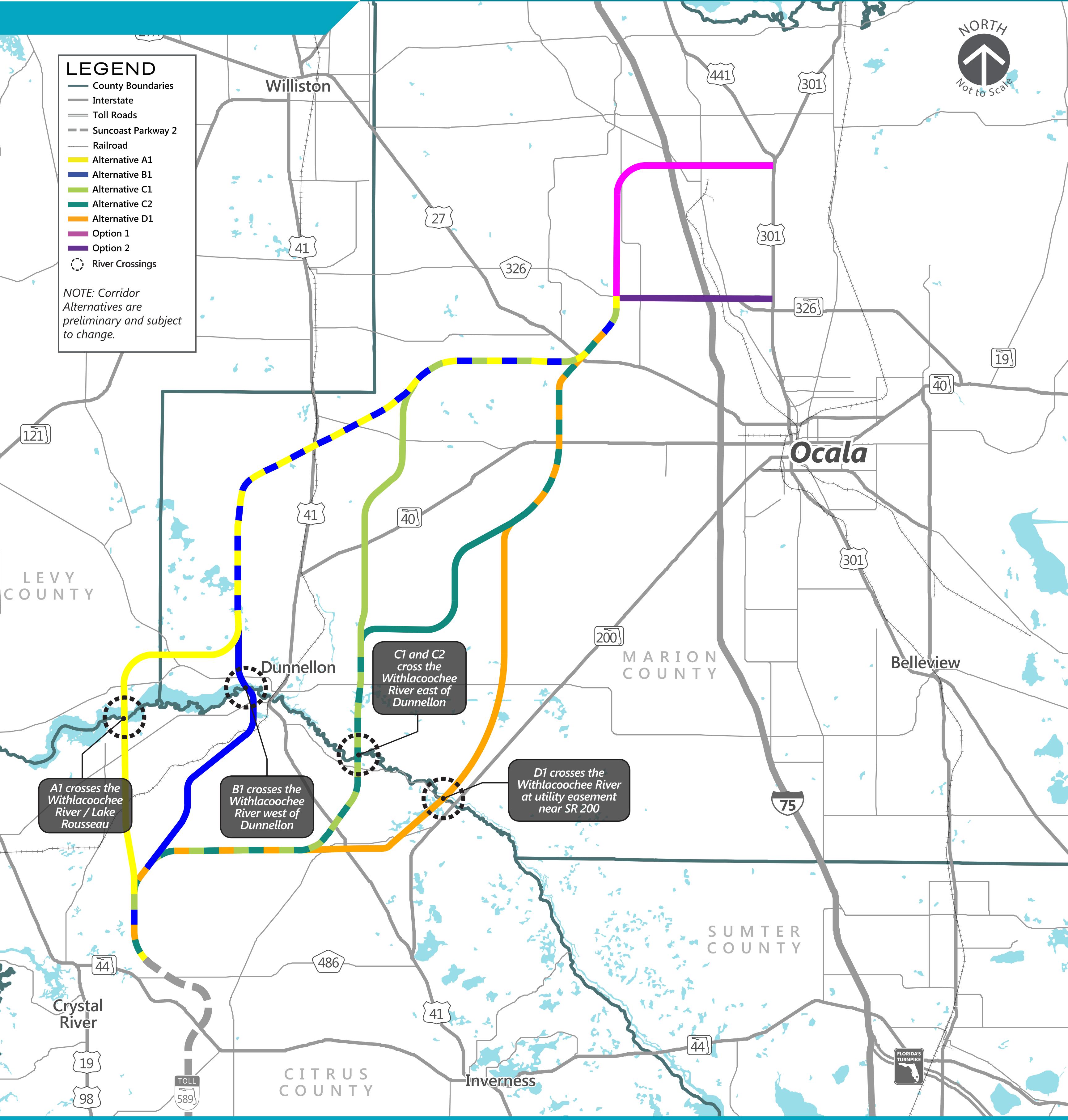

The following pages contain a copy of the DRAFT FY 2024 Priority Projects, the 2018 Trail Priorities and the 2018 Off-System Priorities. There have been the usual changes in programmed funding as the projects progress towards final construction. Additionally, there are number of changes to all of the lists this year. The changes are as follows:

#### 2024 Priority Projects

- **#2: SR 40 Downtown Operational Improvement** The project has been split into two phases and moved from five to two;
- #3 & #7: SR 40 East Multi-Modal Improvement The project has been split into two separate priorities in order to expedite tasks not associated with reconstruction of the intersection at SR 40 & SR 35;
- **#8: US 41 from SW 111<sup>th</sup> Place Lane to SR 40** Project has been added back to the list because of deferred construction funding;
- #21: SW 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue Realignment New project

#### 2018 Trail Projects

- #8: Watula Trail and NE 8<sup>th</sup> Road Trail Projects have been combined into one.
- **#10: Nature Coast Trail** New Project

#### 2018 Off-System Priorities

- #1: SW 44<sup>th</sup> Avenue from SR 200 to SW 32<sup>nd</sup> Street Project has been added back to the list because of deferred construction funding.
- **#10: Lake Tuscawilla Flood Relief** New Project

- To change the state or federal funding allocation of a project;
- To change the year of anticipated funding of a project phase;
- To change the scope of work of a project;
- To change the source of federal or state funds.

The FDOT is requesting the TIP be amended to reflect the additional funding allocations to two projects. They are as follows:

- **431797-2:** NE 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue from SR 492 to NE 35<sup>th</sup> Street: Widen to four lanes. Add \$10k for PE in 2018.
- **431797-3**: NE 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue from SR 492 to NE 35<sup>th</sup> St.: Widen to four lanes. Add \$10k for PE in 2018.

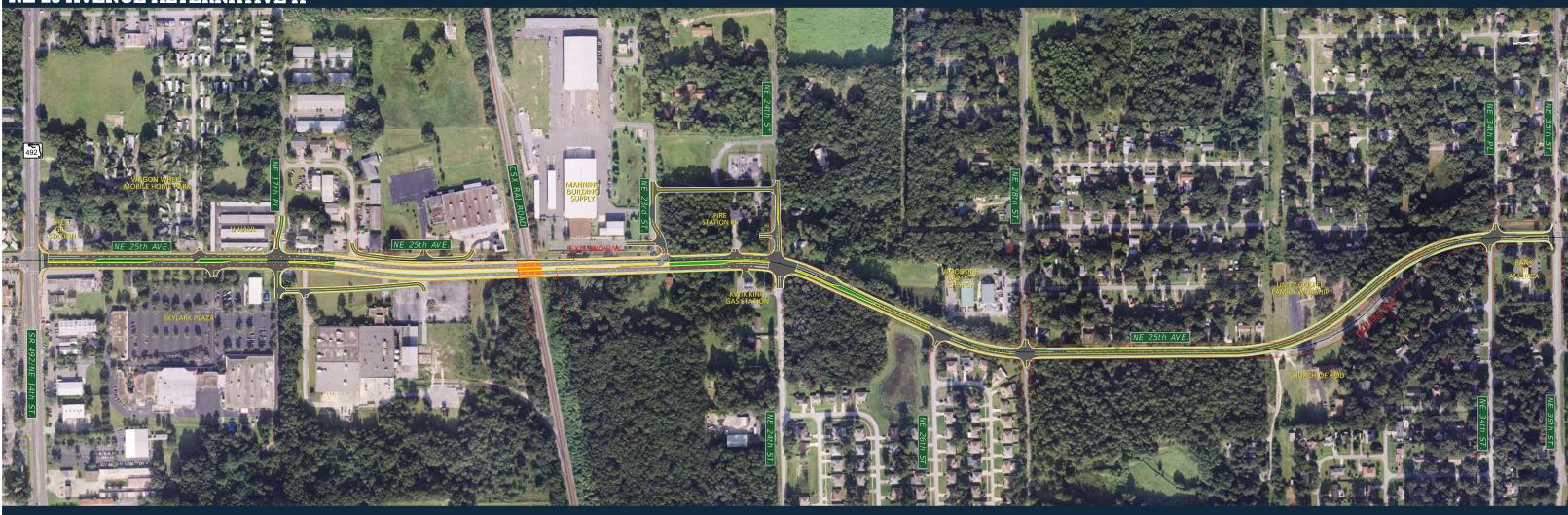

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **PURPOSE**

The Ocala/Marion County TPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) documents the anticipated timing and cost of regional transportation improvements for a period of five years. It is a program that serves as the budget for carrying out the adopted Year 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan. In July 1989, the Florida Legislature passed Senate Bill 1474 which revamped the TIP process in order to provide a more responsive and comprehensive method of developing the annual Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) budget. This TIP represents the federal Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act requirements according to (23 USC 134 (j)) and the state requirement of Florida Statute 339.175 (7). All sections and elements of this document are financially feasible as demonstrated through the TIP implementation schedule with corresponding committed public resources expected to carry out the plan pursuant to (23 USC 135 (g)(4)(D)(ii) and Title 49 CFR, Part 316. The TIP must include federal and state funded projects as well as turnpike, airport, and transit work items.

#### Federal and State Funded Highway Projects

This chapter contains project descriptions for the FDOT District Five 2018/2019 - 2022/2023 Tentative Work Program for federal and state road, enhancement, intersection, and railroad improvement projects. These projects are funded with National Highway System funds, Surface Transportation Program funds, or State Trust funds and are developed by the FDOT based on TPO recommended priorities. Under state law the annually updated TIP shall consist of the state's first year funded improvements and the recommended subsequent four state fiscal years for advancement. This five-year schedule of federal and state projects begins on page 1-1. It is inclusive of the federally funded first three years and consistent with the Department's Tentative Work Program.

#### **Public Transportation Element**

On April 15, 1997, the City of Ocala and Marion County signed an inter-local agreement for the development of a fixed route transit system in Ocala, named SunTran. By December 1998, SunTran had purchased vehicles, established a route network, and contracted with a management company to establish a fixed route transit system and complementary paratransit system in Ocala and Marion County. On December 15, 1998 SunTran began service to the community. Within weeks SunTran had surpassed its sixmonth ridership goals. SunTran currently operates a fleet of nine vehicles on six routes. Daily ridership currently averages 1,353 passengers per weekday.

The City and County have an agreement with the TPO to oversee the transit service and to serve as the policy board for SunTran. The TPO staff operates as SunTran's administrative staff and includes a Senior Planner whose responsibilities include overseeing the contracted transit services and managing the FTA grant process. The TPO contracts with McDonald Transit Associates, Incorporated (MTA), which directly operates and maintains the fixed-route buses. MTA subcontracts for ADA paratransit services with Marion Transit Services, the local Community Transportation Coordinator under the Florida Transportation Disadvantaged Program. This arrangement has proved to provide a complete, comprehensive and cost effective transportation system for the citizens of Ocala and Marion County.

The SunTran service consists of six routes. In downtown Ocala, five of the six routes meet at the Central Transfer Station and provide service to Ocala. The Central Transfer Station is a multimodal terminal providing connections to Greyhound services and formerly to AMTRAK. The sixth route operates from southeast Ocala to the community of Silver Springs Shores. A transfer station located at the Marion County Public Health Unit provides access to the downtown routes from this route. SunTran's routes were developed to provide the greatest access for passengers to local hospitals, major employers, shopping sites, medical offices, schools and housing opportunities. Service operates from approximately 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday. The basic adult fare for SunTran is \$1.50. A reduced fare of \$0.75 is offered throughout the day for seniors, persons with disabilities, and persons with Medicare cards as well as retired and active duty military. Youth and students pay \$1.10. Children five years of age or lower ride free. SunTran also has discounted monthly passes for all categories of passengers. Fares for Marion Transit Service paratransit services are \$2.00. (OIT)

The National Transit Database Report for FY 2018 showed that SunTran provided 30,943 revenue hours and 483,342 revenue miles of service to 409,623 unlinked passengers. Total annual operating expenses for the period were \$1.82 million.

Also included in this Element are funds provided to Marion Transit Services for the provision of transportation services under the Transportation Disadvantaged Program. The State of Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged provides grants to the TPO and to Marion Transit Services, as the CTC. Marion Transit Services was selected as the CTC for Marion County by the Ocala/Marion County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board and the TPO. The funds provided to the TPO are earmarked for planning functions. The funds provided to Marion Transit Services are earmarked for the purchase of non-sponsored trips and equipment. Nonsponsored trips are for any transportation disadvantaged individual that are not covered in whole or part by any other social service agency. Services provided under this program are coordinated by the CTC to increase efficiency as well as to reduce duplication of services.

#### **Aviation Element**

The TIP's Aviation Element addresses the next five years of scheduled FDOT programmed improvements to the Ocala Regional Airport and the Dunnellon/Marion County Airport. The FAA and FDOT are currently involved in numerous planned improvements for both of these regionally significant airports. The FAA general aviation terminal study forecasts that Marion County will experience rapid aviation growth over the next several years.

#### FINANCIAL PLAN

The Ocala/Marion County TIP is financially constrained each fiscal year. All federal and state funded projects can be implemented using current or projected revenue sources. The summary tables on pages 1-1 through 6-2 identify, by funding source, the projects scheduled by fiscal year. These tables correspond to funding available in the FDOT Tentative Five-Year Work Program, demonstrating the document's financial feasibility.

#### PROJECT SELECTION PROCESS

The project selection process is carried out annually by the TPO in accordance with federal requirements (23 C.F.R. 450.324(c)). This requires the Ocala/Marion County TPO to complete its project selection with the support and cooperation of the FDOT District Planning Office in conformance with the TIP process. When a project in the TPO planning area has been identified as a potential project, the TPO requests that FDOT and the FHWA actively pursue the appropriate funding.

The FDOT shall give priority to those projects that are:

- 1. Designed to maximize safe and efficient travel;
- 2. Identified in approved local government comprehensive plans to receive local matching funds in accordance with the provisions of Section 335.20 or to be funded pursuant to the provisions

of Section 339.12;

- 3. Within transportation corridors protected by local government action;
- 4. Used in the operation of or in conjunction with public transportation facilities; and
- 5. Located within the boundaries of a local government which has made a responsible effort to fund improvements needed to accommodate local traffic.

This document translates the local elected government officials' priorities for transportation improvements from the planning level to the actual project development level. The TIP is updated annually to ensure that these priorities are always current with the desires of the members of the local governments.

#### Amendments to or Removals from Transportation Improvement Program

The existing federally approved TIP can be modified at any time when there is a joint agreement between the TPO and FDOT. Modification of a current TIP may require amendment to the FDOT Adopted Work Program. The district may amend the Adopted Work Program based on projects that require mid-year rescheduling, however; any project change requires joint action by the TPO and the FDOT.

Therefore, the TPO may not remove or reschedule any local City,

County, or City/County funded level of service project from the current TIP to a subsequent TIP without an amendment. However, if a locally funded project is a non-level of service requirement, the TPO may unilaterally add, remove, or reschedule any project to the TIP.

Action by the District Secretary is required for all joint TIP amendments that involves the FDOT Adopted Work Program that is to be advanced, deleted, or rescheduled pursuant to the following provisions of paragraph 339.135(7) (c), F.S.:

- (a) The change adds new individual projects;
- (b) The change adversely impacts financial constraint;
- (c) The change results in major scope changes;
- (d) The change deletes and individually listed project from the TIP/STIP; or
- (e) The change results in a cost increase greater than 20% AND \$2 million.

#### **CONSISTENCY WITH OTHER PLANS**

The TIP shall be consistent, to the maximum extent possible, with the approved local government comprehensive plans of the governments within the TPO area. The TPO must indicate any state and federal projects that are not consistent with the comprehensive plans to ensure the TIP's consistency with all applicable federal laws, rules, regulations and guidance available pursuant to (23 USC 134 (h) and (I)).

After the TPO adopts the TIP, it transmits copies to the FDOT District, FAA, EPA, DEO, RPC, State Clearinghouse, Regional Clearinghouse, FTA, Florida Energy Office, and to each Marion County Legislator for review prior to the final submission date. The FDOT District staff sends copies of TIP to FHWA and FDOT Central Office for review of the TIP against the Tentative Work Program and notes any discrepancies for use in preparing the next district work program. The DCA shall notify the TPO of any transportation projects in the TIP that are inconsistent with approved local comprehensive plans per Florida Statute 339.175 (10).

#### **Administrative Amendments**

In the event a TIP amendment is needed prior to a regularly scheduled TPO meeting, the TPO Director is authorized, per the TIP adoption resolution, to perform an administrative TIP amendment. Any administrative amendment is placed on the next TPO agenda for ratification at that meeting.

#### PROJECT PRIORITY SELECTION PROCESS

In November of 2015 the TPO adopted the Year 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan. This Plan has two components, the Needs Plan and the Cost Feasible Plan. The first portion of the plan, the Needs Plan, identified the deficient roadway corridors based upon population, employment and land use projections. The Cost Feasible Plan was developed by prioritizing these deficient corridors based upon the improvement's overall benefit to the highway network as well as available revenues.

The TPO staff evaluates all eligible priority projects based on FDOT and TPO policies. This evaluation includes an objective and technical review of each priority based on the road's level of service, physical condition, facility type, benefit to highway network, construction cost, and scheduled work program phase.

In addition to the process above, the TPO's advisory committees will consider the following factors in the final determination:

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- 2. Increase the safety and security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- 3. Increase the accessibility and mobility options available to people and freight;
- 4. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, and improve quality of life;
- 5. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;

- 6. Promote efficient system management and operation; and
- 7. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.

After the CAC and TAC have prepared their priority recommendation, the TPO Board will review the committee's recommendations for the final TPO adopted Federal and State Priorities. This recommendation will be transmitted to FDOT for the development of the next FDOT Tentative Work Program for Marion County.

#### PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

The Ocala/Marion County TPO strives to involve the public in all phases of the planning process, from the development of the longrange plans to the review of PD&E documents. Public information meetings and hearings are conducted for all FDOT projects throughout the PD&E process to enhance public awareness. Notices of the public information meetings and hearings are mailed to all affected property owners and published in local newspapers. The TIP is also reviewed and approved through a two-stage process wherein the TPO Citizen and Technical Advisory Committees comprise the first stage and the TPO Board offers reviews and offers final approval in the second stage. The draft document is made available to the public through the committee and board meeting notifications posted on the TPO website prior to the committee review and through the TPO Board review. Once the document is approved by the TPO Board, it is posted on the TPO website. A physical copy of the document is

also available to any citizen who requests one. In addition, all meetings of the TPO, CAC and TAC are conducted in accordance with the Sunshine Law, Chapter 286, Florida Statute. The TPO updates and adopts a formal Public Involvement Plan in accordance with 23 USC 450.316(b)(1) of March 28, 1995.

#### **CERTIFICATION**

The most recent certification review was conducted by the Florida Department of Transportation in March 2018. The Department recommended that the urban transportation planning process be certified for fiscal year 2018/2019. The next certification review will be performed in the spring of 2019.

#### INTRODUCTION

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) has been prepared to define the tasks to be performed with funds under Title 23 Sections 134 (Metropolitan Transportation Planning), 135 (Statewide Transportation Planning) and Title 49 (Public Transportation) by the Ocala/Marion County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) for the period July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2020. This document serves to define activities for the general public as well as public officials and agencies that contribute manpower and allocate funds to the transportation planning process. The UPWP provides a description of planning tasks and an estimated budget for each of the planning tasks to be undertaken by the TPO. Planning activities programmed within the UPWP meet the level of effort requirements anticipated by the TPO to meet local priorities as well as the requirements of Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). The state and federal governments provide funding support through the FDOT, the FHWA (PL funds), and the FTA (Section 5305(d) funds). Public involvement for the development of the UPWP is accomplished through the regularly scheduled meetings of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), (draft only) and TPO (draft & final approval). The draft UPWP is also placed on the TPO website for a minimum of 30 days for public review and adoption prior to approval by the TPO. The TPO strives to engage citizens as well as all potential users to be included in all our planning activities including the development of the UPWP. We accomplish this by using social media and traditional print media to announce the availability of the draft UPWP for review and comment. The UPWP also complies with all of the public involvement provisions identified in the Titlve VI Nondiscrimination requirements.

Transportation planning in the Ocala/Marion County TPO planning area is guided by the Year 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The LRTP utilizes input from government officials, citizen's

advisory boards, technical experts and the general public. This plan is used to forecast travel demands in Marion County. The current long-range transportation plan was adopted on November 24, 2015, and includes a Needs Assessment and Cost Feasible Plan. Selected projects from the Cost Feasible Plan are identified in the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) project priority listing. These projects are prioritized on an annual basis.

In December 2015, the <u>Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act</u> (FAST Act) was signed into law. The FAST Act serves as the primary surface transportation legislation and is valid until September 30, 2020. The bill identifies ten factors that shall be considered as part of the review of projects and plans. Those factors are as follows:

- **1**. Support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- 4. Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight;
- **5.** Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve quality of life, promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- **6.** Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation; and
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.

- **9.** Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.
- **10.** Enhance travel and tourism.

Table I, on page 37, illustrates the TPO's consideration of the eight planning factors in the transportation planning process.

In addition to the FAST Act factors, both the FHWA and FDOT periodically develop Planning Emphasis Areas (PEAs) for consideration as part of the transportation planning process. PEAs are not necessarily requirements for the transportation planning process but more concepts that should be considered as part of the process. For FY 2020, FHWA has no Planning Emphasis Areas, FDOT's Planning Emphasis Areas are as follows:

## <u>State</u>

## **Rural Transportation Planning**

MAP-21 defined the structure and responsibilities of designated regional transportation planning organizations in federal regulations for the first time. Florida Statutes include several provisions that require coordination with local governments including those in rural areas. Some rural communities in Florida face significant development pressures and need transportation investments to handle growing populations and economic activities. Others simply struggle to maintain their existing transportation system and with providing services to a spread-out community. MPOs are encouraged to plan for and coordinate with rural governmental entities both within their planning boundaries as well as those areas outside of the current boundaries that are impacted by transportation movements between regions.

## **Transportation Performance Measures**

FHWA has finalized six interrelated performance rules to implement the transportation performance measures framework established by MAP-21 and the FAST Act. Collectively, the rules address challenges facing the transportation system, including: improving safety, maintaining the condition of the infrastructure, reducing traffic congestions, improving the efficiency of the system and freight movement, protecting the environment, and reducing delays in project delivery. The rules established national performance measures. State DOTs and MPOs must establish targets for each measure. Planning documents will identify the strategies and investments used to reach the targets. Progress towards meeting the targets will be reported through new and existing mechanisms. MPOs need to account in their UPWP for the effort necessary to satisfy the federal requirements. As MPOs and Florida DOT venture into this first round of target setting and adopting performance measures into our planning products, more emphasis will be placed on this topic area. The cooperative efforts of Florida's MPOs and DOT to insure this new planning tool will be effective and well-coordinated will need to be shown in the upcoming UPWPs.

## ACES (Automated/Connected/Electric/Shared-use) Vehicles

According to the Federal Highway Administration, "Transportation is in the midst of disruptive change from new technologies (automated and connected vehicles); new institutions (shared mobility firms); and changing attitudes (reduced car ownership). Across the nation, transportation planners are under pressure to develop performance-oriented policies, plans, and investment decisions that consider an increasingly complex transportation landscape. In the process, planners need to consider, but cannot yet reliably predict, the potential impact of disruptive and transformational Connected Vehicle (CV) and Automated Vehicle (AV) technologies on safety, vehicle ownership, road capacity, VMT, land-use, roadway design, future investment demands, and economic development, among others. While some forms of CV and AV are already being deployed across the United States, significant unknowns exist regarding the rate of technology adoption, which types of technologies will prevail in the marketplace, the interaction between CV/AV vehicles and various forms of shared mobility services, and the impacts of interim and widespread levels of CV/AV usage."

Adopting and supporting innovative technologies and business practices supports all seven goals of the Florida Transportation Plan and the federal planning factors found in the FAST Act. ACES may lead to great improvements in safety, transportation choices, and quality of life for Floridians, our visitors and the Florida economy. Though there is a great deal of speculation and uncertainty of the potential impacts these technologies will have, MPOs need to determine how best to address the challenges and opportunities presented to them by ACES vehicles.

Table II, on page 37, illustrates the TPO's consideration of the Planning Emphasis Areas in the transportation planning process.

The UPWP is developed over a four-month period beginning in January. The initial draft is developed by staff and reviewed by the CAC and TAC then the TPO board reviews and approves or recommends modifications to the draft version of the document. The draft is then transmitted to the FDOT, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for review. These agencies provide comments back to TPO staff prior to final adoption. If there are substantial revisions required as a result of multi-agency comments, the final draft is again reviewed by the CAC and TAC prior to submittal to the TPO for final approval. Otherwise, the final draft is submitted directly to the TPO board in May.

#### ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE TPO

The TPO is the public agency responsible for developing policies and procedures to guide the transportation planning process for the Ocala urbanized area. As the body most directly responsible for the guidance of the transportation planning process, the TPO strives to ensure that the recommendations are in keeping with the goals and standards of the federal and state government, Marion County and its incorporated municipalities. The TPO board is composed of five Marion County Commissioners, four Ocala City Council members, the Mayor of Ocala, one Dunnellon City Council member and one Belleview City Commissioner. The TPO staff, the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) assist the TPO with planning support recommendations. The TPO also serves as the oversight and policy board for SunTran, the local transit system. As the TPO is the sole agency responsible for fixed-route transit, an Intergovernmental Coordination and Review agreement for public transportation is not necessary. Each committee carries out its prescribed responsibilities according to adopted bylaws.

The TPO functions include, but are not limited to, the preparation of the required tasks assigned. Its annual responsibilities are to perform the tasks of preparing the UPWP, the TIP, and the annual TPO Audit Report. As with all transportation planning delegated by the federal and state laws, the TPO is responsible for insuring adequate representation and compatibility of state, county, and municipal projects in the transportation planning process. This includes consideration of all modes of transportation with respect to the needs of the elderly and handicapped as outlined in the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The CAC is composed of members of the general public who represent the general welfare of the community. The TAC, composed of engineers, planners, and other related transportation professionals, reviews plans, programs, and projects and recommends solutions to the TPO based on technical expertise. The TDLCB identifies the local needs of the transportation disadvantaged population and investigates alternatives to meet those needs. Additional public input is provided through public meetings, public hearings, and civic meetings.

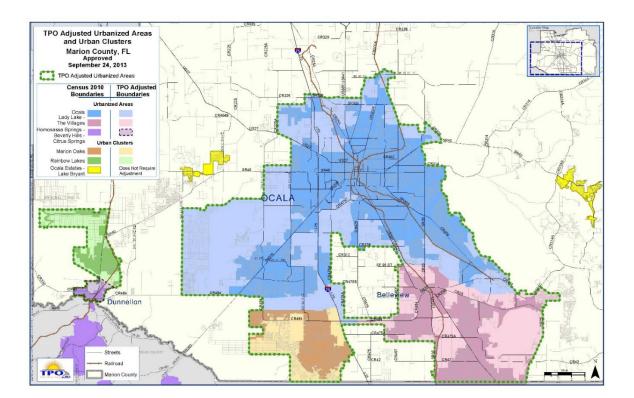
The TPO staff is responsible for collecting and disseminating all information from the transportation planning process to the general public. The work effort required to support the planning process is administered by the TPO staff in cooperation with local governments and the FDOT. Other agencies that are consulted in various phases of the planning process include the Department of Environmental Protection, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the Water Management District Offices.

The Interlocal Agreement for the Creation of the TPO was signed on June 21, 2016, by the four local governments and FDOT. The Agreement established the TPO as the official planning agency for the Ocala urbanized area and the portion of the Lady Lake Urbanized Area within Marion County. Figure 1 illustrates both urbanized areas. The planning area of the TPO covers the entire county. Thereafter, additional JPA's were executed annually for maintaining continued federal and state match funding. In August, 2018, the TPO approved an extension to the JPA for the administration of all planning funds in Section 5305(d)). The Planning Funds JPA was approved for two years on 6/21/16 and is reviewed as part of the annual certification process to ensure consistency with FDOT and TPO policies. The Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement to provide funding for the TPO for planning activities for the previous UPWP was approved on April 26, 2016 and amended on July 25, 2017.

The JPA of March 4, 1991, with the Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD) established the Ocala/Marion County TPO as the Designated Official Planning Agency (DOPA) for transportation disadvantaged planning. This JPA also established the Ocala/Marion County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB). The TPO adopted bylaws for the TPO Board in May, 2004 and bylaws for the TAC in May, 2004 and updated bylaws for the CAC in 2006.

As a result of the 2010 Census, the TPO conducted its decennial review of board structure and membership once the new urbanized areas were announced in Spring 2012. It was anticipated that the new designations would bring about significant challenges due to the potential merging of all or parts of the existing Ocala, Lady Lake, Leesburg-Eustis and Orlando urbanized areas. The merge did not occur; however, a new urbanized area was designated within the existing TPO planning area. The Homosassa Springs-Beverly Hills-Citrus Springs Urbanized Area covers a significant portion of Citrus County with a small portion encompassing the City of Dunnellon and unincorporated Marion County. In May 2013, the TPO submitted to FDOT a letter reaffirming the existing board structure with no changes. Figure 1 illustrates the designated urbanized areas as well at the final smoothed urbanized areas.

#### STATUS OF LOCAL AND REGIONAL PLANNING ACTIVITIES

#### YEAR 2040 LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

In November 2015, the TPO adopted the 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). This development of this plan was somewhat different from previous plan due to primarily to the Great Recession. Like many jurisdictions around the state, the Ocala/Marion area saw significant decreases in traffic counts. These decreases led to a reduction of Needs Assessment projects by about 30%. The plan and its supporting documentation can be viewed at <u>www.ocalamariontpo.org</u>.

#### HIGHWAY PROJECTS

The TPO has continued its involvement in numerous highway projects. A brief outline is as follows:

#### <u>NW 49th Street Interchange</u>

The NW 49<sup>th</sup> Street Interchange is one of the TPO's top priorities. The purpose of the new interchange is to provide improved access to several large-scale industrial parks within the Ocala/Marion County Commerce Park, site of the new distribution centers for FedEx, AutoZone Inc. and Chewy Inc. The Project Development and Environmental (PD&E) Study is nearing completion and Preliminary Engineering (PE) funds are scheduled to be made available by the FDOT in FY 2022. Due to the projected impact of this project, the City of Ocala and the Marion County Board of County Commissioners are partnering to expedite the design and construction of the interchange.

#### <u>SR 40 – SR 35 to CR 314A</u>

The first section of SR 40 from SR 35 to CR 314A is scheduled for construction in 2020. Dating back nearly 30 years, this project underwent an extensive environmental collaboration in in mid- 2000s. In an effort to develop consensus approach, FDOT convened the SR 40 Task Force comprised of agency staff, environmental groups and citizens to develop a comprehensive plan for SR 40 that would allow for the expansion of SR 40 while protecting environmentally sensitive lands along the corridor. This first segment of the project will include numerous wildlife underpasses as well as 12' multiuse path that will be part of the Heart of Florida Loop.

#### <u>US 41 – SW 111<sup>th</sup> Place Lane to SR 40</u>

The US 41 project from SW 111<sup>th</sup> Place Lane to SR 40 will add two lanes to the existing section as well as a multiuse trail. The trail will provide access to the Rainbow Springs State Park for the City of Dunnellon's ever increasing population of recreational cyclists. The project was expected to begin construction in 2019. However, construction funding has been deferred until FY 2022.

#### Corridor Planning

The TPO has developed four corridor plans in the past few years with a particular focus on improving the multimodal environment. Portions of US 441 and SR 40 in and near downtown Ocala were reviewed to enhance multimodal access and traffic operations. Two intersections on US 441 (SR 40 & SR 464) are currently in right-of-way acquisition for pedestrian and operational improvements and the section of SR

40 Downtown (US 441 to NE 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue) has completed design and is awaiting funding for construction This design will include significant rework of the sidewalk system to better accommodate pedestrians as well a new left turn lane at NE 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue and SR 40 to improve access to the northern area of Downtown.

A plan for SR 40 in Silver Springs was initiated to support Marion County's establishment of a Community Redevelopment Area (CRA). Again, this study focuses on improving multimodal facilities, primarily pedestrian but includes a transit element as well. The plan also includes alternatives for a roundabout at the intersection of SR 40 and SR 35. This skewed intersection presents significant issues both for vehicles and pedestrians due to its size. The plan is completed but design alternatives for the development of the roundabout are still being scrutinized by Marion County and the FDOT.

#### **REGIONAL TRAILS**

Over the last two years, the TPO has made significant progress on the development of a regional trail system including the completion of the Land Bridge and Santos Trails segments. The establishment of a regional trail network has been an on-going effort of the Central Florida MPO Alliance and the Department of Environmental Protection. The Heart of Florida Loop crosses four counties: Citrus, Marion, Lake and Volusia and links to the existing Withlacoochee State Trail on the west.

A number of additional trails are also in planning or design phases including connections from the Marjorie Harris-Carr Cross Florida Greenway to the cities of Belleview, Dunnellon and Ocala. Phase I of the Silver Springs Bikeway is due for construction in 2019/2020.

#### PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The TPO serves as the policy and oversight board for SunTran, the area's first fixed-route bus system. Ridership has consistently grown since inception, topping 415,000 in FY 2016. In August 2017, the TPO adopted the 2027 Transit Development Plan (TDP). The TDP identified several short-term, mid-term and long-term improvements including expansion of service hours, improvements to ADA compliance and built on route changes in coordination with SunTran's first Comprehensive Operations Analysis (COA) which was completed in mid-2015. Utilizing data from the Automated Passenger Counter/Computer Aided Dispatch (APC/CAD) system and rider surveys, the COA reviewed SunTran's day-to-day operations to identify improvements in route efficiency and scheduling. TPO and SunTran staff are coordinating the recommended route changes and they will be implemented in the Summer of 2018.

#### BICYCLE/PEDESTRIAN ACTIVITIES

Collaborative efforts with the DEP, FDOT, Marion County Board of County Commissioners and the TPO have resulted in the recent completion of the sixteen miles of paved multi-use trails on the Marjorie Harris-Carr Cross Florida Greenway. Planning and/or design efforts have also progressed on the Silver Springs Bikeway – Phase I, Dunnellon to Greenway Trail, Belleview to Greenway Trail, the Downtown Ocala to Silver Springs Trails, the Indian Lake State Trail, Baseline to Santos Trail and the Pruitt Trail.

Additional activities include the resumption of the Bicycle Rodeo program, now with two operating

programs, in collaboration with the Marion County Health Department of Health and the Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR) and continued cooperative planning efforts with the City of Ocala and the Marion County Board of County Commissioners to expand the urban trails system and identify areas of safety and operational concerns.

# INTELLIGENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS (ITS) MASTER PLAN/AUTOMATED TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (ATMS) IMPLEMENTATION

In February 2008, the TPO completed its first county-wide ITS Plan. The ITS Plan identified priority corridors that would benefit from the implementation of ITS strategies. The Plan was a coordinated effort between the TPO staff and representatives from the Cities of Ocala and Belleview, Marion County and the FDOT. Corridors identified for ITS applications include SR 200, SR 464, US 441, SR 40 and several other major local roads. Since the completion of the Plan, TPO staff has worked with local agency staff and FDOT to implement ITS strategies on various corridors. These strategies comprise the Automated Traffic Management System (ATMS) and include modernizing traffic controllers connected via fiber-optic cables, installation of traffic cameras and establishing Traffic Management Centers (TMC) for both Marion County and the City of Ocala. In late 2015, the TPO worked with both the City of Ocala and Marion County to deploy the area's first adaptive traffic system on SR 464. The TPO is currently working with consultants to update the ITS Plan and identify projects for Phase III deployment and working with the FDOT to activate the 'Frame-On' system on I-75 and the 'Frame-Off' system on US 301.

### PRIORITIES FOR FY 2018/19 AND FY 2019/20

#### TRANSIT DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The TPO recently adopted an update of the Transit Development Plan (TDP) in August of 2017. The TDP is required to be updated every five years as a condition to receiving FDOT Block Grant funds. The TDP used information developed as part of the recently completed COA for existing conditions and services and analyzed potential areas of expansion as well as funding opportunities to fund expansion.

#### **PERFORMANCE MEASURES**

The TPO adopted the mandated Safety Performance Measures on February 27<sup>th</sup> 2018. Mobility, bridge and pavement performance measures are due to be adopted by November 16<sup>th</sup> 2018. TPO staff are currently awaiting final descriptions and requirements for these categories. TPO staff has been actively involved in FDOT's Mobility Performance Team (MPT). The MPT was established to assist FDOT and MPOs/TPOs in implementing the performance measure requirements. Initial performance measures are expected to focus primarily on highway modes but may be expanded to include transit.

2045 LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Activities for the 2045 LRTP over this UPWP cycle include review of the existing model network and TAZ structure and review of potential data sources to develop 2015 base year socioeconomic data and the overall development of the final model network. In addition, TPO staff will continue to coordinate regional model issues through FDOT's modeling coordination committee. Public involvement and planning activities to support the development of the 2045 LRTP are expected to begin in Fall 2018.

#### **ITS MASTER PLAN UPDATE**

As previously mentioned, the TPO adopted its first ITS Master Plan in 2008. Since then, local agencies have made significant strides in deploying various ITS strategies including cameras, Bluetooth monitoring devices, Dynamic Message Signs (DMS) and adaptive signal control. The ongoing Plan update is analyzing progress to date and examining future needs not only in technology but staffing requirements as well. In addition, the Plan will review current incident management practices on I-75 and recommend improvements. Based on a recent FDOT review, I-75 has at least one lane- blocking incident every nine days. The I-75 review will include coordination with both Alachua and Sumter Counties. Coordination with Lake and Sumter Counties will also be required for both US 441 and US 301.

PRIORITIES FOR FY 2018/19 AND FY 2019/20 - CON'T

#### **REGIONAL TRANSIT**

In 2013, the East Central Florida Task Force was convened to develop consensus recommendations for a future transportation corridor to connect Orange, Osceola and Brevard counties (<u>http://www.ecfcorridortaskforce.org/</u>). One of the recommendations made by the Task Force was the development of a Regional Transit Plan that included all nine counties in FDOT District 5. The Plan has identified regional transit strategies to be implemented by 2060. The CFMPOA directors are currently serving as the oversight project committee.

#### NE 8<sup>TH</sup> AVENUE ROAD DIET

The 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue corridor is currently a five-lane configuration with the fifth lane being a single continuous suicide turn-lane from SR 40 to SR 492. In its current configuration, 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue is effectively a physical barrier between Tuscawilla Park west of the corridor and the residential land uses to the east.

In order to "remove the barrier", the City of Ocala proposes to reduce the capacity of the corridor from fivelanes to two-lanes with turn lanes provided in a central landscaped median. Along with the reduction of lanes, the City also proposes to add a twelve-foot multi-use path along the length of the corridor, bus pullouts for the SunTran fixed route system and mid-block protected pedestrian crossings.

## CR 484/PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE STUDY - ADDENDUM

The CR 484/Pennsylvania Avenue corridor in Dunnellon has been identified as a primary connection to the Dunnellon Trail and the Heart of Florida Loop trail system. To date, this corridor has been included in three separate multi-modal enhancement studies and an application for redesign and construction has been submitted to the FDOT. Based on that application, the FDOT has requested that additional conceptual design be completed to indicate where on-street parking should be retained, pedestrian crosswalks and refuges be located and what types of access management treatments will be acceptable to the community.

## Trails, Wayfinding, Safety & Supporting Facilities Master Plan

The development of the trails system within Marion County is progressing rapidly on all levels. The plans to design and construct a large portion of the planned network have already been developed, but planning for supporting amenities for all trail user groups have conceptually progressed in only a handful of locations.

To accurately assess the future needs of all trail user groups, a comprehensive analysis of the characteristics of each user group will be conducted to determine usage patterns such as type of user and activity, average length of activity and frequency of use. Additional analysis should also include user perceptions in terms of safety, cleanliness, maintenance and overall experience. Final recommendations from this study will present a complete list of recommended amenities and future improvements, for the entire trail system, organized by short-term, medium-term and long-term improvements.

Wayfinding contributes to the branding and the visibility of cycling infrastructure and addresses the perception that there is a lack of cycling infrastructure even in areas where there are already safe, accessible cycling routes and supporting facilities. The study would investigate the best alternatives to create an informative and consistent system of directional tools throughout Marion County, both on the developing trails system and surface facilities.

## NATURE TRAIL CONNECTOR FEASIBILITY STUDY

The Nature Trail Connector is part of a trail system that connects the City of Dunnellon to City of Tallahassee. The intent of the Feasibility study is to identify a preferred alignment for a portion of the trail between US 41 and downtown Dunnellon.

## **CR 484 CORRIDOR ASSESSMENT**

The intent of the Corridor assessment on CR 484 between County Road 475A and SW 49<sup>th</sup> Avenue, is to maintain mobility, safety and enhance a key freight corridor and interchange in Marion County as the impact of planned industrial and commercial development increases freight and vehicular traffic.

## **US 27 CORRIDOR ASSESSMENT**

The intent of the Corridor assessment on US 27 between NW 44<sup>th</sup> Avenue and NW 27<sup>th</sup> Avenue, is to maintain mobility, safety and enhance a key freight corridor and interchange in Marion County as the impact of planned industrial and commercial development increases freight and vehicular traffic.

The specific elements of the Unified Planning Work Program are organized into the following tasks:

- 1.0 **Administration**: identifies those functions necessary for proper management of the transportation planning process on a continuing basis.
- 2.0 **Data Collection**: includes the collection and analysis of socioeconomic, land use, and other transportation related data on a continuing basis in order to document changes within the transportation study area.
- 3.0 **Long Range Planning**: includes work related to the development and maintenance of the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) as well as the Efficient Transportation Decision Making Process (ETDM) and items related to Census 2010.
- 4.0 **Short Range Planning**: includes development of the annual Transportation Improvement Program and Priority Project process, reviews of impacts to the transportation system from new development and annual Enhancement Project process.
- 5.0 **Public Transportation**: includes all work items related to SunTran and the Transportation Disadvantaged Program.
- 6.0 **Public Involvement**: describes the activities used to encourage public participation in the transportation planning process.
- 7.0 **Special Projects**: identifies any short-term projects or studies undertaken by the TPO.

Generally, planning tasks are those activities that are not considered to be administrative tasks. Additional work elements related to transit, energy, short-range transportation planning including Congestion Management Process, Transportation Disadvantaged (TD), intermodal/multimodal planning, Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS), and air quality planning shall be included when applicable. The UPWP should address any issues identified during the MPO's most recent certification review and specify the actions the MPO will take to address them.

Each task provides an overview of the activities to be completed and the funding sources and costs associated with those activities. A detailed budget is included in Appendix I & II. Cost categories are as follows:

Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits for TPO staff. Fringe includes retirement, FICA, health insurance, workers compensation and executive benefits.

Travel: Costs for travel.

Direct Expenses\*:

Office: Supplies, Telecomm/IT services, copier (leased), postage, equipment, etc. Facility: Utilities, maintenance, insurance Administrative: Training, legal, audit, etc.

Consultant: *Costs for consultant services.* 

Section 120 of Title 23, United States Code, permits FDOT to use toll revenue expenditures as a credit toward the non-federal matching share of all programs authorized by Title 23. This credit, referred to as a soft match, is listed as state funds in the Planning Funds section of Tables V & VII. For this UPWP, the total soft match is \$288,138, approximately 22% of the FHWA planning funds.

\*purchases of over \$5,000 shall require pre-approval from FHWA.

## **UPWP TASK 1.0 - ADMINISTRATION**

The Program Administration task includes the administrative activities necessary to carry out the transportation planning process.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is a contributor to transportation planning and policy development in District Five. Generally, the specific recurring transportation planning activities accomplished by FDOT's District Five Planning Office can be placed in one of the following categories: Transportation Planning Activities, Data Collection Activities and Systems Planning Activities.

Provide a TPO Liaison between the Department and each TPO; provide supporting information and documentation to support TPO planning; review and take appropriate action on Transportation Improvement Program(TIP) and TIP Amendments; review and take appropriate action on Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and UPWP Amendments; review and take appropriate action on Long Range Transportation Plan; review and take appropriate action on Public Involvement Plan; prepare and conduct

Federal and State Certification reviews; assist MPOs/TPOs in attending various committee meetings and Community Awareness Planning Meetings; assist MPOs/TPOs with Work Program System issues and reports; assist MPOs/TPOs in State and Federal Grant Programs; and support and assist with transit issues and initiatives. Review and update TPO contract agreements (Interlocal Agreement for the Creation of Metropolitan Planning Organization, Intergovernmental Coordination and Review (ICAR), and Transportation Planning Funds Joint Participation Agreement.

Assist with providing revenue forecasts (for federal and state funds) to the TPO to develop their Long Range Transportation Plans; provide support and assistance to ensure that the MPOs/TPOs comply with the state and federal policies, procedures and federal code of regulation, comply with Title VI in the planning process (UPWP, TIP, Model Validation, etc.) and comply with other certification requirements; provide supporting information and documentation to support TPO planning; assist TPO with boundary and membership issues for merging and emerging TPOs.

#### TRANSIT SUPPORT

Provide Transit Analyst services between the Department and the TPO; assist the TPO with transit related issues and initiatives; review and recommend appropriate action on TIP and TIP Amendments and UPWP and UPWP Amendments for transit projects. Provide a FDOT representative to the TPO's Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) Meetings; provide technical assistance to the TDLCB; review and update TPO transit grant agreements for Section 5303 grants and transit programs; Assist the TPO with Work Program and execution of all related system issues and reports.

#### INTERGOVERNMENTAL SUPPORT AND REVIEW

Review and submit recommendations on Local Government Comprehensive Plans (LGCP) amendments, both proposed and adopted, and Evaluation and Appraisal Reports, Capital Improvement Elements (CIEs), and Capital Improvement Plan (CIPs) and TCEAs for appropriate land uses and transportation related impacts on those facilities of state concern. Assist MPOs/TPOs with feasibility studies and implementation planning.

## STRATEGIC INTERMODAL SYSTEM PLAN

TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT & OPERATIONS PROGRAM (TSMO)

Develop a District Five Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSM&O) Program within a team of champions made up of MPOs/TPOs, transit agencies and District staff.

#### DATA COLLECTION ACTIVITIES

#### SYSTEMS INVENTORY

Provide for the efficient transfer of road jurisdiction by the Department and local governments based on mutual agreement; functionally classify roads, including the designation of federal aid eligibility; and develop, analyze, and assign an integrated statewide network of federal, local and state systems.

#### MAPPING

Maintain and provide mapping information related to the SIS; maintain and update functional classification maps.

#### SYSTEM PLANNING ACTIVITIES

### DEVELOPMENT OF REGIONAL IMPACT (DRI) REVIEW

Conduct large scale development review through the DRI process or as requested by Regional Planning Councils. These reviews offer technical comments and may result in

the development and coordination of transportation projects and funding partnerships, including agreements with developers. These projects are then coordinated with the TPO during project development, prioritization, or programming. In addition, provide review and comments for the review of master plans, sectors plans and sub-DRI developments for impacts to the state highway system.

#### SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT

Provide assistance for determining the need for, and feasibility of, new access points (IJRs) and modifications (IMRs) to existing access points on the SIS facilities; conduct Level-of-Service analysis that will determine current and future conditions of the State Highway System; Project Design Traffic and 18 KIP Equivalent Single Axle Loadings (ESALs) preparations.

#### MODELING

The District will continue to support regional transportation modeling activities and gather information on how to make improvements through improved policies, procedures and guidelines for transportation demand forecasting for the Florida Standard Model; assist in validation of models and conduct planning studies requested by local governments and TPOs.

#### STRATEGIC INTERMODAL SYSTEM

Conduct Traffic/Travel Demand Assignment Studies; develop traffic projections; develop and maintain a SIS Needs Plan and SIS Cost Feasible Plan; provide input for SIS modifications and refinements; develop, coordinate and distribute SIS corridor plans.

## FDOT DISTRICT 5 SPECIFIC ACTIVITES

#### TRAFFIC MODELING

The Department will continue to support the District Five MPOs/TPOs (Space Coast TPO, Lake~Sumter MPO, Ocala/Marion TPO, METROPLAN ORLANDO, and River-to- Sea TPO) with ongoing modeling activities applications, enhancements and technical support.

## EFFICIENT TRANSPORTATION DECISION MAKING (ETDM)/SOCIOCULTURAL EFFECTS (SCE)

To assist and collaborate with Space Coast TPO, Lake-Sumter MPO, Ocala/Marion County TPO, METROPLAN ORLANDO and River-to-Sea TPO with the implementation of the Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) Process. District Five is coordinating with each of the MPOs/TPOs to determine which projects should be sent out for an ETDM review.

The District will continue assisting the TPO with their ETDM/SCE (Sociocultural Effects) tasks by helping to coordinate schedules, provide guidance, and assist in

sending projects for Planning Screen reviews, including providing guidance with summary reports for those projects. The District will continue to run Programming Screens on projects prior to PD&E, as required by FHWA, FDOT will provide ETDM technical assistance and training to TPO staff as needed or requested.

## DISTRICT FIVE CENTRAL FLORIDA GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS (CFGIS)

District Five continues to utilize the resources of the Central Florida GIS (CFGIS) initiative. The availability of the Data Clearinghouse allows members of the general public, while providing a user's group forum for GIS users within the Central Florida region, to facilitate data sharing and information exchange. District Five has been a major funding contributor to the CFGIS initiative. Discussions have occurred with the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council (ECFRPC) to further identify the regional data needs, funding partnerships, and the roles and responsibilities of the agencies involved.

The Department is continuing to keep their GIS interactive tools up-to-date utilizing the CFGIS information portal. Some tools currently available on this portal include: TransMap, which serves transit data; the Strategic Intermodal System Implemental & Management (SISIM) tool which allows partners throughout the district to share information concerning the implementation of operational improvements for SIS facilities; etc. Additionally District Five maintains a non-GIS specific information Traffic Data web page on this website. This would make transportation data currently being maintained by the Department more publicly available as an interactive tool to be housed on the CFGIS server.

Where any information required of a Contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the Contractor shall so certify to the *Florida Department of Transportation,* the *Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, Federal Transit Administration, and/or the Federal Motor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the Contractor shall so certify to the <i>Florida Department of Transportation*, the *Federal Highway Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration* as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- (5) **Sanctions for Noncompliance:** In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the *Florida Department of Transportation* shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the *Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration* may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - a. Withholding of payments to the Contractor under the contract until the Contractor complies, and/or
  - b. Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.

- (6) **Incorporation of Provisions:** The Contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the Florida Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance. In the event a Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the Contractor may request the Florida Department of Transportation, and, in addition, the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

# Item 1. Call to Order and Roll Call

Chairman Moore called the meeting to order at 4:01 PM. Secretary Shakayla Jacobs called the roll of members. A quorum was present.

#### Item 2. Proof of Publication

Secretary Shakayla Jacobs stated that the meeting had been published online on the TPO website and on the City of Ocala, Marion County, Belleview, and Dunnellon websites.

# Item 3. Public Comment

Doug Shearer, 2301 SE 85<sup>th</sup> Street, Ocala, FL 34480 spoke about the Belleview connector to paved trail and the Suncoast Connector.

Mr. Shearer said he was in favor of "Option A" and would like to see it funded because he did not want to have two more horse crossings.

Mr. Shearer also said that he was not in favor of the Suncoast Connector that would take roadways through Marion County disturbing the horse farms.

#### Item 4a. Presentation on the Central Florida Transit Study

Tim Crobons with Hanson Professional Services presented a slideshow presentation to the board and highlighted that the Central Florida Regional Transit Study covered a 10-county area (Brevard, Flagler, Lake, Marion, Orange, Osceola, Polk, Volusia, Seminole and Sumter) and would provide transit investment and policy assessment, regional travel pattern and market analysis, and a regional transit vision framework for 2060. The purpose of the District 5 – led study was to:

• Create consensus on regional priorities;

- Collect data on current and projected traffic demands;
- Incorporate changing demographics and technologies as well as increased desire for transportation options;
- Identify gaps and opportunities in transit planning, from land use policy to funding;
- Create a vision for the future of transit in East Central Florida, with specific suggestions of projects in which to invest.

There was board discussion about additional information on the transit study.

# Item 5a. FY 2024 Priority Project List

Mr. Daniels informed the board that after discussions with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) the TPO would bring the FY 2024 Priority Project List as a discussion item and would table any action until the May 22<sup>nd</sup> TPO meeting.

Mr. Odom presented the FY 2024 Priority Project List and said that there had been the usual changes in the programmed funding as the projects progressed toward final construction. Additionally, there were several changes to all the lists this year. The changes were as followed:

2024 Priority Projects

• **#5: SR 40 Downtown Operational Improvement** – The project has been split into two phases;

• **#8: US 41 from SW 111th Place Lane to SR 40** – Project has been added back to the list because of deferred construction funding;

• #21: SW 40th Avenue Realignment – New project

#### 2018 Trail Projects

- #8: Watula Trail and NE 8th Road Trail Projects have been combined into one.
- #10: Nature Coast Trail New Project

#### 2018 Off-System Priorities

• #1: SW 44th Avenue from SR 200 to SW 32nd Street – Project has been added back to the list because of deferred construction funding.

• #10: Lake Tuscawilla Flood Relief – New Project

Mr. Odom mentioned a new project that came from FDOT #28 on the 2024 Priority Projects list US 301-South (SE 143<sup>rd</sup> Place to CR 42). The Central Office of FDOT had asked the TPO to move the project up for a higher ranking on the Priority List and said it would be necessary for hurricane evacuation.

Commissioner Moore asked if FDOT would be providing the funding for the project.

Mr. Odom replied, FDOT would not be providing the funding and that when FDOT looked at allocation of funding for all districts there was a formula used to do so. FDOT asked that the local funding be used to cover the expenses of the project.

Mr. Odom said that after TPO staff discussed moving the US 301 project up the list staff said that it could be done but there were other projects on the list that were important and would have to be moved down the list.

Commissioner Moore said that he would be more willing to move the project up the list if FDOT provided the funding but without them providing funding he was opposed to moving the project up on the Priority List.

Commissioner Bryant asked if any additional funding from Hurricane Irma would help to fund the project.

Mr. Odom replied that no other funding would be used for the project.

There was more board discussion and ultimately the board was opposed to moving the project up to a higher ranking without any funding being provided by FDOT.

*Ms. Bryant made a motion to table the FY 2024 Priority Project List until the May 22<sup>nd</sup> TPO Board Meeting. Mr. Malever seconded and the motion passed unanimously.* 

# Item 5b. Belleview to Greenway Trail Corridor Feasibility Analysis

Mr. Jon Sewell with Kimley Horn and Associates presented the Belleview to Greenway Trail Corridor Feasibility Analysis and said that in recent years, through multi-agency collaborative efforts, the Ocala/Marion County TPO had directed a great deal of resources to the development of the trail systems on the Marjorie Harris-Carr Greenway and throughout Marion County. A large part of that effort had not only been the development of the rural trail system, but also conceptualizing and studying potential connections from urban centers to those rural trail systems.

The City of Belleview was the last of the three cities in Marion County to navigate through the process and four alternatives had been developed to connect from Lake Lillian Park to different points on the greenway.

Mr. Jon Sewell presented all Alternatives to the board as followed:

# Alternative A

Alternative A would begin at Lake Lillian Park using SE 109th Place, SE 110th Street, and SE 52nd Court to connect with SE 102nd Place. From SE 102nd Place, the trail will continue westward to connect with U.S. 27/301/441. Alternative A will then continue north along U.S. 27/301/441 to the intersection with SE 80<sup>th</sup> Street. From this location, the trail would head west until it connects with the Santos Trailhead and Campground facility.

# Alternative B

Alternative B would begin at Lake Lillian Park using SE 109th Place, SE 110th Street, and SE 52nd Court to connect with SE 102nd Place. From SE 102nd Place the trail would continue west to connect with U.S. 27/301/441. Alternative B would head north along U.S. 27/301/441 to SE 100th Street where it would head west to SE 36th Avenue. The trail would then head north to the intersection with SE 95th Street, where the trail would then head slightly west to travel north along SE 35th Court. At the northern terminus of SE 35th Court, the trail would go west through the Cross-Florida Greenway to connect with the CFGT.

# Alternative C- was eliminated due to safety concerns

Alternative C would begin at Lake Lillian Park using SE 109th Place, SE 110th Street, and SE 52nd Court to connect with SE 102nd Place. From SE 102nd Place, the trail would continue westward to connect with U.S. 27/301/441. From U.S. 27/301/441 the alternative will head north to the intersection with SE 100th Street. Alternative C would follow SE 100th Street west until the intersection with SE 36th Avenue where the trail would turn north to the intersection with SE 95th Street. From the location, Alternative C would continue west along SE 95th Street until it reaches the CFGT crossing located just east of SE 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

# Alternative D

Alternative D represented the combination of Alternatives A and B. Alternative D would begin at Lake Lillian Park using SE 109th Place, SE 110th Street, and SE 52nd Court to connect with SE 102nd Place. From SE 102nd Place, the trail would continue westward to connect with U.S. 27/301/441. Alternative D would then continue north along U.S. 27/301/441 to the intersection with SE 100th Street. From SE 100th Street the trail would split into two routes, one continuing north and another going west. One route would continue north along U.S. 27/301/441 to SE 80th Street where the trail would head west until it connects with the Santos Trailhead and Campground facility. From SE 100th Street, the second route of the trail would head west to SE 36th Avenue then head north to the intersection with SE 95th Street, where the trail would head slightly west then travel north along SE 35th Court. At the northern terminus of SE 35th Court, the trail would go west through the Cross-Florida Greenway to connect with the CFGT.

There was board discussion about the different Alternatives.

Ms. Bryant made a motion to approve Alternative D as the next step to the Belleview to Greenway Trail Corridor Feasibility Analysis. Mr. Grabelle seconded. A roll-call vote was called and the motion passed unanimously.

# Item 6. Consent Agenda

Ms. Bryant made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. Ms. Hanchar seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

# Item 7. Comments by FDOT

Ms. Kersey presented the board with an updated monthly Construction Report.

Ms. Kersey also mentioned that FDOT had funding available for Law Enforcement Agencies to conduct High Visibility Enforcement Operations to improve bicycle and pedestrian safety and said she sent the link to the TPO Secretary, Shakayla Pullings and that she would be sending the link out to the board.

# Item 8. Comments by TPO Staff

Mr. Daniels said that the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) would be coming to the board at the next TPO Board meeting on May the 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Mr. Daniels said that there would two Coastal Connector meeting and that TPO staff would send out the meeting location and time for the board.

Mr. Daniels also introduced Derrick Harris, the TPO's new Transportation Planner.

Mr. Daniels also said that a Triple Crown Rodeo Skills Test for Transit Drivers was taking place in Daytona and one of the SunTran Drivers were going to participate in the rodeo.

# Item 9. Comments by TPO Members

There were no comments by TPO members.

#### Item 10. Public Comment

Michelle Shearer, 2301 SE 85<sup>th</sup> Street, Ocala, FL 34480 said that Alternate B for the Belleview to Greenway would be more than making a path but lighting was needed. Also, SE 35<sup>th</sup> Court which goes through the mobile home park has five cross streets that come in there and that there was a safety concern.

Ms. Shearer also talked about trail crossings she was opposed to that would interrupt horse riders and expressed safety concerns.

Ms. Shearer expressed that she was opposed to Alternative B.

Jessie Barnard, 10460 SE 32<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, Ocala, FL said the traffic light by Publix on the north side of 441 at Mojos took a downward dip and said a suggestion was to put a tunnel under 441 like on 49<sup>th</sup> and 484 to eliminate people with strollers trying to cross busy intersections.

Ms. Barnard also said she was opposed to the trail crossings on the horse trails and expressed safety concerns as well.

THIS METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION AGREEMENT (Agreement) is made and entered into on this day of \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2018, by and between the STATE OF FLORIDA, DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (Department), an agency of the State of Florida, whose address is Office of the District Secretary, 719 S. Woodland Boulevard, DeLand, FL 32720 and the Ocala/Marion County Transportation Planning Organization (MPO), whose address is 201 SE 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor, Ocala, FL 34471, and whose Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) Number is: 0559474280000 (collectively the "parties").

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and representation herein, the parties desiring to be legally bound, do agree as follows:

- Authority: The MPO and the Department have authority to enter into this Agreement pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 23 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR or C.F.R.) §450 and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes (F.S.), which, require the Department and the MPO to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities for cooperatively carrying out the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) portion of the Metropolitan Planning Process and accomplishing the transportation planning requirements of state and federal law.
- 2. Purpose of the Agreement: The purpose of this Agreement is to pass through financial assistance through the Department in the form of FHWA funds to the MPO for the completion of transportation related planning activities set forth in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) of the MPO (Project), state the terms and conditions upon which FHWA funds will be provided, and set forth the manner in which work tasks and subtasks within the UPWP will be undertaken and completed. The Project is more fully described in the UPWP, which is attached and incorporated into this Agreement as Exhibit "A".
- 3. Scope of Work: The UPWP, Exhibit "A", constitutes the Scope of Work for this Agreement.
- 4. **Project Cost:** The total budgetary ceiling for the Project is \$<u>1,306,426</u>. The budget, including tasks, is summarized below and detailed in the UPWP, Exhibit "A". The budget may be modified by mutual agreement as provided for in paragraph 7, Amendments.

The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature. No work shall begin before the Agreement is fully executed and a "Letter of Authorization" is issued by the Department. The total of all authorizations shall not exceed the budgetary ceiling established for this agreement and shall be completed within the term of this Agreement:

5. Term of Agreement: This Agreement shall have a term of two (2) years. This Agreement shall begin on the later of July 1, 2018 or the date the Agreement is fully executed, whichever is later and expire on June 30, 2020. If the Agreement is fully executed after July 1, 2018, then the term of the Agreement shall be less than two (2) years and the Agreement shall expire on June 30, 2020. Expiration of this Agreement will be considered termination of the Project. The cost of any work performed after the expiration date of this Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department.

- 6. Renewals and Extensions: This Agreement shall not be renewed or extended.
- 7. Amendments: Amendments may be made during the term of this Agreement. Any amendment must be in writing and signed by both parties with the same formalities as the original Agreement.
  - A. Modifications versus Amendments to the UPWP: Modifications and amendments to the UPWP budget may occur periodically. Modifications shall not increase the FHWA approved UPWP final total budget or change the scope of the FHWA approved work tasks. If the MPO makes a modification to the UPWP budget, then the MPO shall immediately send any such modifications to the Department. The Department will then forward the modifications to FHWA. Each budget category subtotal and individual line item costs contained in this Agreement are only estimates. The total budgetary ceiling cannot be exceeded, but shifts between budget categories and budget line items are acceptable and shall not require an amendment of the UPWP or this Agreement. Changes in the scope of an approved work task, the addition or deletion of an approved work task, or changes altering the total funding of an FHWA approved UPWP shall be considered amendments to the UPWP. Amendments to the UPWP must be approved by FHWA. Proposed amendments to the UPWP shall be filed with the Department. Within a reasonable amount of time, the Department shall review and transmit the proposed UPWP amendment and supporting documents to the FHWA with a recommendation for approval or denial. Transmittal of the proposed UPWP amendment and supporting documents to FHWA may be delayed by the Department due to the MPO failing to include all documentation required for the UPWP amendment. The Department shall immediately forward to the MPO all correspondence that the Department receives from FHWA with regard to the proposed UPWP amendment. If FHWA approves the amendment to the UPWP then this Agreement and supporting documentation must be amended immediately following such approval.

#### 8. General Requirements:

- **A.** The MPO shall complete the Project with all practical dispatch in a sound, economical, and efficient manner, and in accordance with the provisions in this Agreement, the Interlocal Agreement establishing the MPO, and all applicable laws.
- B. Federal-aid funds shall not participate in any cost which is not incurred in conformity with applicable Federal and State laws, the regulations in 23 C.F.R. and 49 C.F.R., and policies and procedures prescribed by the Division Administrator of FHWA. If FHWA or the Department determines that any amount claimed is not eligible, federal participation may be approved in the amount determined to be adequately supported and the Department shall notify the MPO in writing citing the reasons why items and amounts are not eligible for federal participation. Where correctable non-compliance with provisions of law or FHWA requirements exists, Federal funds may be withheld until compliance is obtained. Where non-compliance is not correctable, FHWA or the Department may deny participation in Project costs in part or in total. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- **C.** The MPO's financial management system must comply with the requirements set forth in 2 CFR §200.302, specifically:
  - i. Identification, in its accounts, of all Federal awards received and expended and the Federal programs under which they were received.
  - **ii.** Accurate, current, and complete disclosure of the financial results of each Federal award or program in accordance with the reporting requirements set forth in §§200.327 Financial reporting and 200.328 Monitoring and reporting program performance.
  - iii. Records that identify adequately the source and application of funds for federally-funded activities. These records must contain information pertaining to Federal awards, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, expenditures, income and interest and be supported by source documentation.
  - iv. Effective control over, and accountability for, all funds, property, and other assets.
  - v. Comparison of expenditures with budget amounts for each Federal award.
  - vi. Written procedures to implement the requirements of §200.305 Payment.
  - vii. Written procedures for determining the allowability of costs in accordance with Subpart E—Cost Principles of this part and the terms and conditions of the Federal award.

#### 9. Compensation and Payment:

- A. The Department shall reimburse the MPO for costs incurred to perform services satisfactorily during a monthly or quarterly period in accordance with Scope of Work, Exhibit "A". Reimbursement is limited to the maximum amount authorized by the Department. The MPO shall submit a request for reimbursement to the Department on a quarterly or monthly basis. Requests for reimbursement by the MPO shall include an invoice, an itemized expenditure report, and progress report for the period of services being billed that are acceptable to the Department. The MPO shall use the format for the invoice, itemized expenditure report and progress report that is approved by the Department. The MPO shall provide any other data required by FHWA or the Department to justify and support the payment requested.
- **B.** Pursuant to Section 287.058, Florida Statutes, the MPO shall provide quantifiable, measurable, and verifiable units of deliverables. Each deliverable must specify the required minimum level of service to be performed and the criteria for evaluating successful completion. The Project and the quantifiable, measurable, and verifiable units of deliverables are described in Exhibit "A".
- **C.** Invoices shall be submitted by the MPO in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit based on the quantifiable, measurable and verifiable units of deliverables as established in Exhibit "A". Deliverables must be received and accepted in writing by the Department's Grant Manager prior to payments.
- D. The Department will honor requests for reimbursement to the MPO for eligible costs in the amount of FHWA funds approved for reimbursement in the UPWP and made available by FHWA. The Department may suspend or terminate payment for that portion of the Project which FHWA, or the Department acting in lieu of FHWA, may designate as ineligible for federal-aid. In regard to eligible costs, whichever requirement is more strict between federal and State of Florida requirements shall control. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- E. Supporting documentation must establish that the deliverables were received and accepted in writing by the MPO and must also establish that the required minimum level of service to be performed based on the criteria for evaluating successful completion as specified in the UPWP, Exhibit "A", was met. All costs charged to the Project, including any approved services contributed by the MPO or others, shall be supported by properly executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts or vouchers evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges.
- F. Bills for travel expenses specifically authorized in this Agreement shall be documented on the Department's Contractor Travel Form No. 300-000-06 or on a form that was previously submitted to the Department's Comptroller and approved by the Department of Financial Services. Bills for travel expenses specifically authorized in this Agreement will be paid in accordance with Section 112.061 Florida Statutes.
- **G.** Payment shall be made only after receipt and approval of goods and services unless advance payments are authorized by the Chief Financial Officer of the State of Florida under Chapters 215 and 216, Florida Statutes. If the Department determines that the performance of the MPO fails to meet minimum performance levels, the Department shall notify the MPO of the deficiency to be corrected, which correction shall be made within a time-frame to be specified by the Department. The MPO shall, within sixty (60) days after notice from the Department, provide the Department with a corrective action plan describing how the MPO will address all issues of contract non-performance, unacceptable performance, failure to meet the minimum performance levels, deliverable deficiencies, or contract non-compliance. If the corrective action plan is unacceptable to the Department, the MPO shall be assessed a non-performance retainage equivalent to 10% of the total invoice amount. The retainage shall be applied to the invoice for the thencurrent billing period. The retainage shall be withheld until the MPO resolves the deficiency. If the deficiency is subsequently resolved, the MPO may bill the Department for the retained amount during the next billing period. If the MPO is unable to resolve the deficiency, the funds retained may be forfeited at the end of the Agreement's term.
- H. An invoice submitted to the Department involving the expenditure of metropolitan planning funds ("PL funds") is required by Federal law to be reviewed by the Department and issued a payment by the Department of Financial Services within 15 business days of receipt by the Department for review. If the invoice is not complete or lacks information necessary for processing, it will be returned to the MPO, and

the 15 business day timeframe for processing will start over upon receipt of the resubmitted invoice by the Department. If there is a case of a bona fide dispute, the invoice recorded in the financial system of the Department shall contain a statement of the dispute and authorize payment only in the amount not disputed. If an item is disputed and is not paid, a separate invoice could be submitted requesting reimbursement or the dispute item/amount could be included/added to a subsequent invoice.

- I. Records of costs incurred under the terms of this Agreement shall be maintained and made available upon request to the Department at all times during the period of this Agreement and for five years after final payment is made. Copies of these documents and records shall be furnished to the Department upon request. Records of costs incurred include the MPO's general accounting records and the project records, together with supporting documents and records, of the consultant and all subconsultants performing work on the project, and all other records of the Consultants and subconsultants considered necessary by the Department for a proper audit of costs.
- J. The MPO must timely submit invoices and documents necessary for the close out of the Project. Within 90 days of the expiration or termination of the grant of FHWA funds for the UPWP, the MPO shall submit the final invoice and all financial, performance, and related reports consistent with 2 CFR §200.
- **K.** The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is also contingent upon FHWA making funds available and approving the expenditure of such funds.
- L. In the event this Agreement is in excess of \$25,000 and has a term for a period of more than one year, the provisions of Section 339.135(6)(a), Florida Statutes, are hereby incorporated:

"The Department, during any fiscal year, shall not expend money, incur any liability, or enter into any contract which, by its terms, involves the expenditure of money in excess of the amounts budgeted as available for expenditure during such fiscal year. Any contract, verbal or written, made in violation of this subsection is null and void, and no money may be paid on such contract. The Department shall require a statement from the comptroller of the Department that funds are available prior to entering into any such contract or other binding commitment of funds. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the making of contracts for periods exceeding 1 year, but any contract so made shall be executory only for the value of the services to be rendered or agreed to be paid for in succeeding fiscal years, and this paragraph shall be incorporated verbatim in all contracts of the Department which are for an amount in excess of \$25,000 and which have a term for a period of more than 1 year."

M. Disallowed Costs: In determining the amount of the payment, the Department will exclude all Project costs incurred by the MPO prior to the effective date of this Agreement, costs incurred by the MPO which are not provided for in the latest approved budget for the Project, and costs attributable to goods or services received under a contract or other arrangements which have not been approved in writing by the Department. It is agreed by the MPO that where official audits by the federal agencies or monitoring by the Department discloses that the MPO has been reimbursed by the Department for ineligible work, under applicable federal and state regulations, that the value of such ineligible items may be deducted by the Department from subsequent reimbursement requests following determination of ineligibility. Upon receipt of a notice of ineligible items the MPO may present evidence supporting the propriety of the questioned reimbursements. Such evidence will be evaluated by the Department, and the MPO will be given final notification of the amounts, if any, to be deducted from subsequent reimbursement requests.

In addition, the MPO agrees to promptly reimburse the Department for any and all amounts for which the Department has made payment to the MPO if such amounts become ineligible, disqualified, or disallowed for federal reimbursement due to any act, error, omission, or negligence of the MPO. This includes omission or deficient documentation of costs and charges, untimely, incomplete, or insufficient submittals, or any other reason declared by the applicable Federal Agency.

Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.

- N. If, after Project completion, any claim is made by the Department resulting from an audit or for work or services performed pursuant to this Agreement, the Department may offset such amount from payments due for work or services done under any agreement which it has with the MPO owing such amount if, upon demand, payment of the amount is not made within 60 days to the Department. Offsetting any amount pursuant to this paragraph shall not be considered a breach of contract by the Department. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- **O. Indirect Costs:** A state or federally approved indirect cost rate may be applied to the Agreement. If the MPO does not have a federally approved indirect cost rate, a rate up to the de minimis indirect cost rate of 10% of modified total direct costs may be applied. The MPO may opt to request no indirect cost rate, even if it has a federally approved indirect cost rate.

#### **10. Procurement and Contracts of the MPO**

- **A.** The procurement, use, and disposition of real property, equipment and supplies shall be consistent with the approved UPWP and in accordance with the requirements of 2 CFR §200.
- **B.** It is understood and agreed by the parties to this Agreement that participation by the Department in a project with the MPO, where said project involves a consultant contract for engineering, architecture or surveying services, is contingent on the MPO's complying in full with provisions of Section 287.055, Florida Statutes, Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act, the federal Brooks Act, 23 C.F.R. 172, and 23 U.S.C. 112. At the discretion of the Department, the MPO will involve the Department, to an extent to be determined by the Department, in the consultant selection process for all projects funded under this Agreement. In all cases, the MPO shall certify to the Department that selection has been accomplished in compliance with the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act and the federal Brooks Act.
- **C.** The MPO shall comply with, and require its consultants and contractors to comply with applicable federal law pertaining to the use of federal-aid funds.
- 11. Audit Reports: The administration of resources awarded through the Department to the MPO by this Agreement may be subject to audits and/or monitoring by the Department. The following requirements do not limit the authority of the Department to conduct or arrange for the conduct of additional audits or evaluations of Federal awards or limit the authority of any State agency inspector general, the State of Florida Auditor General or any other State official. The MPO shall comply with all audit and audit reporting requirements as specified below.
  - A. In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, monitoring procedures may include but not be limited to on-site visits by Department staff and/or other procedures including, reviewing any required performance and financial reports, following up, ensuring corrective action, and issuing management decisions on weaknesses found through audits when those findings pertain to Federal awards provided through the Department by this Agreement. By entering into this Agreement, the MPO agrees to comply and cooperate fully with any monitoring procedures/processes deemed appropriate by the Department. The MPO further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations or audits deemed necessary by the Department, State of Florida Chief Financial Officer (CFO) or State of Florida Auditor General.
  - **B.** The MPO, a non-Federal entity as defined by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, as a subrecipient of a Federal award awarded by the Department through this Agreement is subject to the following requirements:
    - i. In the event the MPO expends a total amount of Federal awards equal to or in excess of the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the MPO must have a Federal single or program-specific audit for such fiscal year conducted in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements. Exhibit "B", Federal Financial Assistance (Single Audit Act), to this Agreement provides the required Federal award identification information needed by the MPO to further comply with the requirements of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements. In determining Federal awards expended in a fiscal year, the MPO must consider all sources of Federal awards based on when the activity related to the Federal award occurs, including the Federal award provided through the Department by this

Agreement. The determination of amounts of Federal awards expended should be in accordance with the guidelines established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F – Audit Requirements. An audit conducted by the State of Florida Auditor General in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F – Audit Requirements, will meet the requirements of this part.

- **ii.** In connection with the audit requirements, the MPO shall fulfill the requirements relative to the auditee responsibilities as provided in 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements.
- iii. In the event the MPO expends less than the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, in Federal awards, the MPO is exempt from Federal audit requirements for that fiscal year. However, the MPO must provide a single audit exemption statement to the Department at <u>FDOTSingleAudit@dot.state.fl.us</u> no later than nine months after the end of the MPO's audit period for each applicable audit year. In the event the MPO expends less than the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, in Federal awards in a fiscal year and <u>elects</u> to have an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the cost of the audit must be paid from non-Federal resources (*i.e.*, the cost of such an audit must be paid from the MPO's resources obtained from other than Federal entities).
- iv. The MPO must electronically submit to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse (FAC) at <u>https://harvester.census.gov/facweb/</u> the audit reporting package as required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditor's report(s) or nine months after the end of the audit period. The FAC is the repository of record for audits required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, and this Agreement. However, the Department requires a copy of the audit reporting package also be submitted to FDOTSingleAudit@dot.state.fl.us within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditor's report(s) or nine months after the end of the audit period as required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements.
- V. Within six months of acceptance of the audit report by the FAC, the Department will review the MPO's audit reporting package, including corrective action plans and management letters, to the extent necessary to determine whether timely and appropriate action on all deficiencies has been taken pertaining to the Federal award provided through the Department by this Agreement. If the MPO fails to have an audit conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the Department may impose additional conditions to remedy noncompliance. If the Department determines that noncompliance cannot be remedied by imposing additional conditions, the Department may take appropriate actions to enforce compliance, which actions may include but not be limited to the following:
  - 1. Temporarily withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by the MPO or more severe enforcement action by the Department;
  - 2. Disallow (deny both use of funds and any applicable matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance;
  - 3. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate the Federal award;
  - 4. Initiate suspension or debarment proceedings as authorized under 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and Federal awarding agency regulations (or in the case of the Department, recommend such a proceeding be initiated by the Federal awarding agency);
  - 5. Withhold further Federal awards for the Project or program;
  - 6. Take other remedies that may be legally available.
- vi. As a condition of receiving this Federal award, the MPO shall permit the Department, or its designee, the CFO or State of Florida Auditor General access to the MPO's records including financial statements, the independent auditor's working papers and project records as necessary. Records related to unresolved audit findings, appeals or litigation shall be retained until the action is complete or the dispute is resolved.

- **C.** The MPO shall retain sufficient records demonstrating its compliance with the terms of this Agreement for a period of five years from the date the audit report is issued and shall allow the Department, or its designee, the CFO or State of Florida Auditor General access to such records upon request. The MPO shall ensure that the audit working papers are made available to the Department, or its designee, the CFO, or State of Florida Auditor General of five years from the date the audit report is issued unless extended in writing by the Department.
- **12. Termination or Suspension:** The Department may, by written notice to the MPO, suspend any or all of the MPO's obligations under this Agreement for the MPO's failure to comply with applicable law or the terms of this Agreement until such time as the event or condition resulting in such suspension has ceased or been corrected. The Department will provide written notice outlining the particulars of suspension.

The Department may terminate this Agreement at any time before the date of completion if the MPO is dissolved or if federal funds cease to be available. In addition, the Department or the MPO may terminate this Agreement if either party fails to comply with the conditions of the Agreement. The Department or the MPO shall give written notice to all parties at least ninety (90) days prior to the effective date of termination and specify the effective date of termination.

The parties to this Agreement may terminate this Agreement when its continuation would not produce beneficial results commensurate with the further expenditure of funds. In this event, the parties shall agree upon the termination conditions.

Upon termination of this Agreement, whether for cause or at the convenience of the parties, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, reports, maps, drawings, models, photographs, etc., prepared by the MPO shall, at the option of the Department, be delivered to the Department.

The Department shall reimburse the MPO for those eligible expenses incurred during the Agreement period that are directly attributable to the completed portion of the work covered by this Agreement, provided that the work has been completed in a manner satisfactory and acceptable to the Department. The MPO shall not incur new obligations for the terminated portion after the effective date of termination.

The Department reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this Agreement for refusal by the MPO or any consultant, sub-consultant or materials vendor to allow public access to all documents, papers, letters or other material subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and made or received in conjunction with this Agreement unless the records are confidential or exempt.

The conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement shall not delay or stop the Parties' rights to terminate the Agreement.

**13. Remedies:** Violation or breach of Agreement terms by the MPO shall be grounds for termination of the Agreement. Any costs incurred by the Department arising from the termination of this Agreement shall be paid by the MPO.

This Agreement shall not be considered as specifying the exclusive remedy for any dispute, but all remedies existing at law and in equity may be availed of by either party and shall be cumulative.

- 14. Conflict and Dispute Resolution Process: This section shall apply to conflicts and disputes relating to matters subject to this Agreement, or conflicts arising from the performance of this Agreement. If possible, the parties shall attempt to resolve any dispute or conflict within thirty (30) days of a determination of a dispute or conflict. This section shall not delay or stop the Parties' rights to terminate the Agreement. In addition, notwithstanding that a conflict or dispute may be pending resolution, this section shall not delay or stop the Department from performing the following actions pursuant to its rights under this Agreement: deny payments; disallow costs; deduct the value of ineligible work from subsequent reimbursement requests, or; offset pursuant to Section 9.N of this Agreement.
  - A. Initial Resolution: The affected parties to this Agreement shall, at a minimum, ensure the attempted early resolution of conflicts relating to such matters. Early resolution shall be handled by direct discussion

between the following officials: for the Department - the Intermodal Systems Development Manager; and for the MPO - the Staff Director.

- **B.** Resolution by Senior Agency Official: If the conflict remains unresolved, the conflict shall be resolved by the following officials: for the Department the District Secretary; and for the Ocala/Marion County Transportation Planning Organization the Chairperson of the MPO.
- **C.** Resolution of Conflict by the Agency Secretary: If the conflict is not resolved through conflict resolution pursuant to the provisions, "Initial Resolution" and "Resolution by Senior Agency Official" above, the conflict shall be resolved by the Secretary for the Department of Transportation or their delegate. If the MPO does not agree with the resolution provided by the Secretary for the Department of Transportation, the parties may pursue any other remedies set forth in this Agreement or provided by law.
- **15. Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy and Obligation:** It is the policy of the Department that DBE's, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 26, as amended, shall have the opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Department funds under this Agreement. The DBE requirements of applicable federal and state laws and regulations apply to this Agreement.

The MPO and its contractors and consultants agree to ensure that DBE's have the opportunity to participate in the performance of this Agreement. In this regard, all recipients and contractors shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and regulations to ensure that the DBE's have the opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. The MPO and its contractors, consultants, subcontractors and subconsultants shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of contracts, entered pursuant to this Agreement.

#### 16. Compliance with Federal Conditions and Laws:

- A. The MPO shall comply and require its consultants and subconsultants to comply with all terms and conditions of this Agreement and all federal, state, and local laws and regulations applicable to this Project. Execution of this Agreement constitutes a certification that the MPO is in compliance with, and will require its consultants and subconsultants to comply with, all requirements imposed by applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.
- **B.** The MPO shall comply with the "Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion Lower Tier Covered Transactions," in 49 C.F.R. Part 29, and 2 C.F.R. Part 200 when applicable and include applicable required provisions in all contracts and subcontracts entered into pursuant to this Agreement.
- **C. Title VI Assurances:** The MPO will comply with all the requirements imposed by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation issued thereunder, and the assurance by the MPO pursuant thereto, including but not limited to the requirements set forth in Exhibit "C", Title VI Assurances. The MPO shall include the attached Exhibit "C", Title VI Assurances, in all contracts with consultants and contractors performing work on the Project that ensure compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 C.F.R. Part 21, and related statutes and regulations.
- D. Restrictions on Lobbying The MPO agrees that to no federally-appropriated funds have been paid, or will be paid by or on behalf of the MPO, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence any officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement. If any funds other than federally-appropriated funds have been paid by the MPO to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions. The MPO shall require that the language of this paragraph be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all

subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly. No funds received pursuant to this Agreement may be expended for lobbying the Legislature, the judicial branch or a state agency.

- E. The MPO must comply with FHWA's Conflicts of Interest requirements set forth in 23 CFR §1.33.
- **17. Restrictions, Prohibitions, Controls, and Labor Provisions:** During the performance of this Agreement, the MPO agrees as follows, and shall require the following provisions to be included in each contract and subcontract entered into pursuant to this Agreement :
  - A. A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.
  - B. In accordance with Section 287.134, Florida Statutes, an entity or affiliate who has been placed on the Discriminatory Vendor List, kept by the Florida Department of Management Services, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity.
  - **C.** An entity or affiliate who has had its Certificate of Qualification suspended, revoked, denied or have further been determined by the Department to be a non-responsible contractor may not submit a bid or perform work for the construction or repair of a public building or public work on a contract with the MPO.
  - D. Neither the MPO nor any of its contractors and consultants or their subcontractors and subconsultants shall enter into any contract, subcontract or arrangement in connection with the Project or any property included or planned to be included in the Project in which any member, officer or employee of the MPO or the entities that are part of the MPO during tenure or for 2 years thereafter has any interest, direct or indirect. If any such present or former member, officer or employee involuntarily acquires or had acquired prior to the beginning of tenure any such interest, and if such interest is immediately disclosed to the MPO, the MPO, with prior approval of the Department, may waive the prohibition contained in this paragraph provided that any such present member, officer or employee shall not participate in any action by the MPO or the locality relating to such contract, subcontract or arrangement. The MPO shall insert in all contracts entered into in connection with the Project or any property included or planned to be included in any Project, and shall require its contractors and consultants to insert in each of their subcontracts, the following provision:

"No member, officer or employee of the MPO or of the locality during his or her tenure or for 2 years thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof."

The provisions of this paragraph shall not be applicable to any agreement between the MPO and its fiscal depositories or to any agreement for utility services the rates for which are fixed or controlled by a governmental agency.

**E.** No member or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit arising therefrom.

#### 18. Miscellaneous Provisions

#### A. Public Records:

i. The MPO shall allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other material subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and made or received by the MPO in conjunction with this Agreement, unless such documents are exempt from public access or are confidential pursuant to state of federal law. Failure by the MPO to grant such public access shall be grounds

for immediate unilateral cancellation of this Agreement by the Department.

- **ii.** In addition, the MPO shall comply with the requirements of section 119.0701, Florida Statutes.
- B. It is specifically agreed between the parties executing this Agreement that it is not intended by any of the provisions of any part of the Agreement to create in the public or any member thereof, a third party beneficiary hereunder, or to authorize anyone not a party to this Agreement to maintain a suit for personal injuries or property damage pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement..
- C. In no event shall the making by the Department of any payment to the MPO constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Department of any breach of covenant or any default which may then exist on the part of the MPO and the making of such payment by the Department, while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Department with respect to such breach or default.
- **D.** If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance, the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.
- E. By execution of the Agreement, the MPO represents that it has not paid and, also agrees not to pay, any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of its application for the financing hereunder.
- F. Nothing in the Agreement shall require the MPO to observe or enforce compliance with any provision or perform any act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable state law. If any of the provisions of the Agreement violate any applicable state law, the MPO will at once notify the Department in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Department and the MPO to the end that the MPO may proceed as soon as possible with the Project.
- **G.** The MPO shall comply with all applicable federal guidelines, procedures, and regulations. If at any time a review conducted by Department and or FHWA reveals that the applicable federal guidelines, procedures, and regulations were not followed by the MPO and FHWA requires reimbursement of the funds, the MPO will be responsible for repayment to the Department of all funds awarded under the terms of this Agreement.
- H. The MPO:
  - i. shall utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by MPO during the term of the contract; and
  - ii. shall expressly require any contractor, consultant, subcontractors and subconsultants performing work or providing services pursuant to the state contract to likewise utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by the subcontractor or subconsultant during the contract term.
- I. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute the same Agreement. A facsimile or electronic transmission of this Agreement with a signature on behalf of a party will be legal and binding on such party.
- J. The parties agree to comply with s.20.055(5), Florida Statutes, and to incorporate in all subcontracts the obligation to comply with s.20.055(5), Florida Statutes.
- K. This Agreement and any claims arising out of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the United States and the State of Florida.

During the performance of this contract, the consultant or contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "contractor") agrees as follows:

- (1.) Compliance with REGULATIONS: The contractor shall comply with the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation (hereinafter, "USDOT") *Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21,* as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the *REGULATIONS)*, which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- (2.) Nondiscrimination: The Contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the selection and retention of sub-contractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the REGULATIONS, including employment practices when the contract covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the REGULATIONS.
- (3.) Solicitations for Sub-contractors, including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under sub-contract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential sub-contractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under this contract and the *REGULATIONS* relative to nondiscrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex.
- (4.) Information and Reports: The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the REGULATIONS or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Florida Department of Transportation or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such REGULATIONS, orders and instructions. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the contractor shall so certify to the Florida Department of Transportation, or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, or Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- (5.) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the Florida Department of Transportation shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, or Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - a. withholding of payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies, and/or
  - b. cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- (6.) Incorporation of Provisions: The contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every sub-contract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the *REGULATIONS*, or directives issued pursuant thereto.
